Taco Soup

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pound burger
- 1 medium onion, chopped (or 1 cup frozen chopped onion)
- 2 15-ounce cans pinto beans
- 2 14.5-ounce cans stewed tomatoes
- 1 15-ounce can corn
- 1 4-ounce can diced green chili peppers
- 11-ounce package ranch seasoning
- 11-ounce package taco seasoning
- 1 tablespoon chili powder

DIRECTIONS

- 1 In a large pot, brown burger and onion. Drain.
- 2 Add all cans and ingredients to the pot, plus one cup water.
- 3 Bring to a boil.
- 4 Turn heat to low and simmer for one hour.
- 5 Serve with tortilla chips and shredded cheese.




Bright ideas to save

Use your dishwasher

Using an energy-efficient dishwasher can save both water and energy compared to washing dishes by hand.

Do not build or pour concrete near meter



Do not encase risers or meters in concrete



Always keep area around meter clear



Ensure proper ventilation

Your safety is our top priority. We want to educate customers about the importance of avoiding pouring cement or placing any structures around your natural gas meter.

Why is this important?

- State and federal regulations strictly prohibit encasing risers and meters in concrete. Additionally, the lock wing valve must remain accessible at all times in case of an emergency. If concrete is placed near a riser, you must use a sleeve to prevent direct contact.
- Clear access for our crews. Natural gas meters require 10' clearance above porches/decks and in a radius in front of the meter to allow safe access for maintenance, repairs, or emergencies.
- Proper ventilation and flow to your home. Your natural gas meter's regulator vent must always be clear so the flow of natural gas into the home can be

regulated properly. If this vent becomes obstructed, the pressure of gas flowing into the home could either increase to a dangerous level, resulting in a fire, explosion or the buildup of deadly carbon monoxide, or decrease, preventing natural gas from flowing to your gas appliances.

How can you help?

- Always keep the area around your meter clear of cement, structures or obstructions.
- If you're planning to do any construction or landscaping near the meter, please contact us.
- Report any suspicious changes or damages to any gas meter and lines immediately.

Let's work together to keep your family, neighbors and our crews safe. We work 24/7, year-round to keep our communities safe, but we need your help to prevent avoidable hazards and damages.

Hang with Louie and Sniffy this summer



What to do if your vehicle contacts a power line

Stay in the vehicle and call 911 for help.



If you must exit the vehicle because of a fire, tuck your arms across your body and jump clear of any wires with your feet together, never touching the equipment and ground at the same time. Then hop or shuffle at least 40 feet away, keeping your feet together.



Stay away from the equipment until the authorities tell you it is safe.
